The Mobile CrimeLab

Le Laboratoire << CrimeLab >> Mobile

The Canadian Communication Association and the University of Waterloo Critical Media Lab (CML) invites all participants to visit its mobile exhibition: the Mobile CrimeLab.

Funded by SSHRC and CFI, the Critical Media Lab supports interdisciplinary research-creation projects that draw on new media to investigate the impact of technology on society and the human condition. The CML is also the home of the English Department's M.A. in Experimental Digital Media at the University of Waterloo. In 2012, the "CrimeLab" has moved out of its storefront location in downtown Kitchener.

In response to the Congress 2012 theme of "At the Crossroads" and with the support of the Canadian Communication Association, the CML celebrates its nomadic status by relocating to a truck during the conference, which is parked on the campus of Wilfrid Laurier University. Delegates are invited to enter the truck and examine some of the critical media projects completed by the CML collaborators in the field of mobile computing and augmented reality. The Mobile CrimeLab will also act as a screening surface for evening projections, as video work from students and artists will be showcased on the side of the truck. The entire project will be overseen by CML Director, Marcel O'Gorman. Please join us in taking part in these unique digital experiences!

Keynote Speaker / Conferencier d'honneur Jussi Parikka

Media Matters as Ecology

This talk discusses "media materialism", but not only in the manner as we usually understand the term. Besides carrying the legacy of so-called German media theory (a controversial term itself) and Friedrich Kittler's research orientation, media materialism can be extended towards an analysis of obsolescence. In this talk, this refers primarily to electronic waste, as well as environmentally and biologically (to workers) dangerous processes of manufacture. Media materialism turns to the smallest of particles, such as dust, and tracks a media trajectory of dust, and other things seemingly insignificant. Hence, this approach is about materiality of media, and various ways in which we might be able to use the longer traditions of media theory in this excavation.

De l'importance de l'écologie médiatique

Cette conférence traite du « matérialisme médiatique », sans toutefois l'aborder de manière traditionnelle. En plus de porter l'héritage de la « théorie médiatique allemande » (une étiquette elle-même controversée) de même que celui de l'approche proposée par Friedrich Kittler, le matérialisme médiatique peut également être étendu à l'analyse de l'obsolescence. Pour ce faire, cette communication se penchera sur les déchets électroniques ainsi que sur les dangers environnementaux et biologiques (pour les travailleurs) liés à leur production. Le matérialisme médiatique se tourne ainsi vers les particules les plus fines, telle la poussière, afin de tracer la trajectoire médiatique de cette poussière et d'autres objets qui semblent insignifiants. Ce faisant, cette approche traite de la matérialité des médias tout en explorant de quelles façons les théories médiatiques passées peuvent être utiles à une telle exploration.

Le professeur Jussi Parikka est un auteur et théoricien des médias. Il enseigne dans le domaine des médias et du design à la Winchester School of Art (University of Southampton). Il est également professeur adjoint en théories de la culture numérique à l'Université de Turku, en Finlande, et professeur invité à la Anglia Ruskin University, Cambridge.

Dr. Parikka is a writer, media theorist and Reader in Media & Design at Winchester School of Art (University of Southampton). He is also Adjunct Professor of Digital Culture Theory at University of Turku, Finland and Honorary Visiting Fellow at Anglia Ruskin University, Cambridge.






Science Building at Wilfrid Laurier University
